1992 was a banner year for WMFC programs

If 1992 had a theme at West Midland Family Center, it was certainly one of new growth and challenges for everyone.

Many new programs began, with enthusiastic response and support. These new programs illustrate the continued mission of WMFC to provide high-quality educational, social and recreational programs for western Midland County residents.

A highlight of the past year clearly would be the Summer Program, which was paid for in part by a Venture Grant from the United Way to provide literacy-based activities in conjunction with the many typical recreational programs that have taken place in the past. Approximately 150 children ages 4 to 14 years registered for the six-week program which offered tutoring, a reading contest, crafts, learning about health and fitness,

field trips and a variety of kids' clubs, in addition to many of the fun outdoor activities you'd expect to find in the summer!

A new year of Preschool has gotten under way, with 36 "at-risk" four-year-olds receiving daily classroom learning and playing opportunities. These educational experiences will help these children develop the skills necessary to succeed in school, at a time which is so critical in their development.

Our adult recreational programs are going strong, with more than 40 women competing in the volleyball league, and 128 men playing in the basketball leagues. Needless to say, the gym is a very busy

Several special Holiday events took place at WMFC which attracted much attention from local families. In April, the Easter Eggstravaganza provided 150 children like atmosphere to celebrate Easter.

In October, the WMFC Haunted House was a smashing success, with over 300 people daring to take the "Fright Walk" and another 150 participating in the "Lil' Goblins Party."

The Family Power Network, a group of related human services agencies, sponsored three Family Days at WMFC during the recent fall months. In September, Mid-Michigan Alliance provided families with home weatherization tips. while in October, Red Cross and Midland-Gladwin Mental Health officials spoke about home safety and first aid. In November, Michigan State Cooperative Extension Service offered shopping and "penny-pinching" advice.







Midland Foundation, WMFC Auxiliary make travel easier

"The van has been a tremendous help in providing service to our preschoolers," said Gail Crosby, preschool coordinator. "Last year we had to use our old school bus and many times it was not up to the task. This year the kids get to school every day!"

The youth program also has made good use of the van by attending the Midland County Fair, the Midland Roll-Arena and Detroit Pistons basketball games.

"Most of the kids that attend these field trips would have no other way of ever getting to these recreation events if it wasn't for the center providing transportation," said Recreation Director Jamie Smith. "But, what I'm really going to like about the van is next summer when the bus is full on our large field trips. I'm not going to have to tell as many kids you can't go. We'll have an additional 14 spaces now that is going to make for 14 more happy campers."

WMFC would like to personally thank Gene Arnold, Eileen Starks, Ginny Morrison and all of our other supporters at the Midland Foundaion for making these education and recreational opportunities available.

Thanks, again and again, goes to the Auxiliary's Chuck Norisez, Donna Hackett and our faithful Bingo volunteers for their continuing contributions. In 1992, the Auxiliary volunteers gave more than \$27,000 to the center for operations and special projects.

"The Sharing Tree program once again made the largest impact for the sheer number of recipients," WMFC Executive Director Greg Dorrien said.

Of the \$11,000 in presents distributed through the center, \$8,000 worth came through Sharing Tree, a program run by the Voluntary Action Center, a United Way agency.

"This is the first year I can remember that when Christmas rolled around we didn't have anyone on a holiday waiting list," said long-time WMFC employee Diane Dauer. "The difference this year was all the additional contributions that came in after the Sharing Tree deadline passed."

as the groups and individuals that gave them," Dorrien added. "Like the Chamber of Commerce, they let us collect used children's clothes a their annual holiday open house and instead of used clothes we received almost all new clothes, toys and even a \$100 cash donation from John and Judy Rapanos."

"Gifts were showing up from all sorts of sources - Christmas trees from the Midland Jaycees, bags of food and clothes from Cub Scout Troop Nr. 3703, the Midland Daily News, Regis Styling Salon, Greendale Happy Diners and even the center received a present - a Communitree from the Midland Target store," Dauer said.
