Expansion Project Funded – Architect and Contractor Named

Derek Smith Named New Coordinator For Wellness, Recreation

tion into the soon to be expanded facility. As part of the ongoing growth of programming, and the preparation for the expansion, Derek was recently hired as our first full-time Recreation and Wellness Coordinator, thanks to a United Way of Midland

County Venture grant.

Derek is a recent graduate of CMU's Parks and Recreation Administration program. He grew up in Durand, and currently calls Mount Pleasant home. Among his many hobbies are fly fishing, softball and hockey... (he has appointed himself the official staff cheerleader for the Red Wings).

The West Midland Family Center Expansion project is a "go"!

Five local foundations have pledged the \$2.8 million necessary to fund the project which is scheduled for completion in late 2000. The Swimming Pool portion will probably be delayed to coincide with the arrival of summer weather.

With the money "in hand", detailed planning is now possible. Dow-Howell-Gilmore Associates Inc. has been selected as the Architect, with Jack Lee as the Project Architect. Three Rivers Construction, with Bob Crivic acting as the Senior Project Manager, has been named General Contractor.

Jerry Schaar, a Dow retiree with extensive experience in commercial building, has been

engaged as Owner's Representative for the project. He will receive input from Orrin Barrett and Jim LaBean, former members of the Center Board, who were very much involved in the planning and construction of the current facility.

The project and its four major elements will nearly double the size of the center. There will be

additional areas for educational programs and services, a second gym, an outdoor pool, and modifications and additions to provide additional study rooms, conference rooms and office space.

Center President Bob Dostal said: "I know I express the heartfelt thanks of our Board, our Staff... and particularly the West Midland Community... for the confidence expressed in our performance by the five foundations who have supplied the funds. thing like this before... and we could never have imagined this kind of enthusiastic turnout.


