WMFC - Helping Families Face the Challenge of Difficult Times

Family Focus may be wondering how WMFC and the community it serves are coping with the difficult financial times this country and our community are facing. To provide a perspective on this we submit the following:

Unfortunately, we do not have control over the U.S. economy—only our response to it. West Midland's Family Services staff members and partners are seeing the detrimental effects that the economy is having on local families. Working together with community partners like Catholic Family Services and the United Way of Midland County, we continue to reach out a helping hand to individuals and families in poverty.

"The poor are becoming progressively poorer. Subsidies that poor people receive remain relatively fixed while the cost of living goes up-- generated primarily by higher energy costs, which impacts deeply embedded. In addition, staff

"With the economy holding poverty-level people down, it becomes increasingly more difficult for them to rise socially through the traditional ladders of better education and employment."

> "Over the past 10 years, people living in poverty are finding it increasingly more difficult to find respite. They struggle with a sense of not having a future and there are fewer "safety nets" available to allow them to climb out of poverty. We learn how to be adults from our parents. If our parents instill a sense of having no future, they pass along this sense of hopelessness to their own children," concluded Quinn.

> Without intervention, some studies show, each subsequent generation's dysfunctions become stronger and more

of security for middle income families. "When families are faced with long term unemployment, it is devastating. These are not people that understand the system. They have never had to ask for help and don't know where to turn," commented Renee Young, WMFC Family Services Director. "We're seeing a rise in prescription drug use across all ages, greater need for mental health services

attend the program is \$1,600 per student, so most of our families would have great difficulty funding this kind of opportunity for their children. We're all very fortunate to live in a community where people do for their neighbor whenever they can," concluded Dorrien.

"This is a great opportunity", exclaimed new preschool teacher Stephanie Varner." This new program will get the children excited for school. It will also give them tools to be successful in school and in life. The addition of the threes program makes WMFC a more rounded facility by providing quality experiences from early on in life. It will allow the children to learn and grow into better adjusted and well rounded students. The love and friendships they will receive will hopefully give them a feeling of great self worth and enjoyment."

The three-year-old classroom has three main goals this year:

#1 Learn Social Skills - that will help them in all future academics. They will be given an opportunity to interact with others and learn about the lives and feelings of others. Learning how to name and manage their emotions will allow them to be more successful in relationships and also in their overall well being.

#2 Establish an Academic Base - this

will jumpstart their school experience. Learning patterning is a forefront to learning math. Colors teach them about their environment and art. Singing teaches rhyming and counting, and is a way to learn brand new concepts.

#3 Have Fun

"I want this experience to be one that gets them excited to learn and excited to go to school. I love seeing kids smiling faces on the other side of the classroom door each day. That just adds enthusiasm to whatever we are learning about that day. I think that a love for school at the beginning leads to school success and enjoyment later on. It certainly can create lifelong learners," concluded Varner.
