Throughout 2022, a number of organizations supported WMFC not only financially, but with gifts of time and talent. Whether hard-earned time or hard-earned dollars, WMFC programs are made better as a result of the efforts of community groups and donors.

Among the many financial supporters, the *Midland Kiwanis Foundation* graciously donated \$25,000 toward tuition scholarships for the WMFC 3's Preschool Program. They

also donated \$2,500 in support of preschool field trips and \$6,000 toward the expansion of the WMFC Preschool Outdoor Learning Area. In addition, they volunteered many hours to help build and install the new outdoor learning features.

In the early fall, the *United Way of Gratiot and Isabella Counties* presented a \$7,500 check to WMFC's Shepherd Community Preschool Staff and the WMFC Family Services Department in support of the *Born to Thrive* program to help Shepherd preschool families.

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Marcy Young's Work Life Comes Full Circle

Marcy Young has recently been named the WMFC Children's Programs/Licensing Director. Young is a familiar face at WMFC. Her varied experiences in early childhood and education have provided her with a valuable skill set that makes her a perfect fit for her new role at WMFC.

"In 2006, I was hired by WMFC as an associate teacher for the preschool program," explained Young. "At the conclusion of my first year, WMFC expanded the preschool program to include a classroom at *Bullock Creek Elementary*. I was hired as the lead teacher for the *Bullock Creek Community Preschool* where I eventually became site director," continued Young. "I taught at Bullock Creek for six years before I learned that our *Regional Preschool Partnership (RPP)* was looking to fill an *Early Childhood Specialist (ECS)* role."

"For seven years I worked as an ECS, supporting teaching teams and administrators in early childhood programs across four counties. Our goal was to provide high-quality preschool with fidelity to the *Great Start Readiness Program (GSRP)* model. I achieved my master's degree in early childhood education before my ECS position was eliminated in 2019. I then returned to the classroom as a GSRP teacher at the *Meridian Early Childhood Center* where I taught for the last three years before life brought me full circle back to WMFC this year. Envisioning myself returning to West Midland was easy," commented Young. "I hadn't forgotten what an impactful organization WMFC was nor the amazing people I'd worked with in the past. I think that my experiences since I last worked at WMFC have uniquely shaped me for this new role."

"Having taught in two different GSRP's I know our state-funded program model very well. I've also gained an even better understanding of the challenge's educators face and the dedication needed to be an educator."

"My immediate goals for the WMFC Preschool Program are to build back some of the elements that were lost during the pandemic such as consistent in-person

school, visiting and learning about our community through field trips, welcoming volunteers and offering family engagement opportunities. This will be a slow but steady process."

"Normally, anytime we fill an important position at WMFC, I have a few sleepless nights wondering if the new person is going to fit in comfortably with the rest of the team," explained *Greg Dorrien, WMFC Executive Director*, "but since I had those worries 15 years ago with Marcy, I already knew she'd fit right in. I just couldn't be happier that she returned to lead our largest department," continued Dorrien. "Marcy's implementation of our first off-site preschool program at Bullock Creek Elementary School way back in the day helped give us confidence to know we could do additional off-site programs successfully."

Director. "The completion of the renovated kitchen is just another example of our great partnership and mutual commitment to older adults. We cannot wait to resume cooking our meals at WMFC and continue to grow the number of older adults who join us for great meals along with lots of fun and activities!

"The total project cost \$278,000 which included changes to the HVAC system for the dining room and associated roof top equipment," explained Dorrien. "*Three Rivers Corporation* did a great job keeping the project within budget. They did an even better job of keeping after supply chain vendors so we'd end up with a fully functioning kitchen that passes all the rigorous health department inspections."

"I'd like to thank *Earl Soules* for making my life easier by volunteering to be our Project Manager," concluded Dorrien. "It's the same role he preformed for us during the 2017 building expansion project that took up two full years of his life. Earl, I won't ask you to do it again...at least not until next spring!"
