How WMFC Childcare Effects One Little Girl

According to the American Academy of Pediatrics, "All of a child's early experiences, whether at home, in child care, or in other preschool settings, are educational. Statistically, 60% to 70% of children younger than six years regularly attend some type of out-of-home early childhood program. For many families, high-quality child care is not affordable, which results in compromises."

Stephanie Varner is the WMFC 3's Preschool Teacher/Director. Her daughter **Finley**, is enrolled in West

Midland Family Center Childcare.

Here, from her perspective as a mom, Stephanie shares her experience as part of the WMFC child care family: "Even though Finley was born with special needs, I want to give her a typical high quality child care experience," "I find WMFC a perfect fit for Finley and our family for many reasons. One difference I have found between WMFC and other child care centers is the staff. I really appreciate that the director, Jillian Westphal, is so engaged in the daily operations. Parents have a voice. Their concerns are addressed quickly and appropriately," explained Varner. "The staff is energized, they care about each child and are open to trying new things. I have actually been given opportunities to educate staff and answer questions regarding my child's special needs."

"WMFC is affordable. I have a friend paying \$1500 - \$2,000 per month for child care, which is a cost our family could never afford," exclaimed Varner. "At the same time, WMFC is the only child care that I know of that has access to such an awesome facility filled with so many varied opportunities. On any given day, Finley and her classmates can be found playing on the playground, in

the gyms, or the multipurpose room ...and what other child care center has a bowling center? At the age of two, Finley is learning how to bowl!"

WMFC Childcare is under the same roof as the **Greendale Senior Center.** Intergenerational experiences are an important part of programming. "One of the best parts of Finley's day is seeing her friend **Gerald (Burkett)** who visits the senior center every morning. Gerald and Finley really hit it off and have become fast friends," explained Varner, "We actually leave home early every morning so that Gerald and Finley can have their time together at the Welcome Center before I have to get her to child care."

Varner is a teacher, so she is able to have her children at home with her during the summer. "This past summer, Finley stayed home rather than attending childcare. In the fall, a month after returning to WMFC, I noticed a profound shift in Finley's development and a change in her that was so dramatic it utterly amazed me. While at WMFC Finley is so much more outgoing and independent... characteristics that don't often reveal themselves at home," shared Varner, "The interactions that Finley has with the staff and her classmates challenge and motivate her. Her language use

expands and she has a different aura about her...she is so much more confident," continued Varner, "when she returns home from child care, Finley interacts differently with her brother. She stands up for herself and expresses herself in ways that I know are the result of what she has worked on here."

"WMFC is constantly evolving, changing and investing in its programs in ways that pay the highest dividends for each child. For Finley, WMFC is home because she is accustomed to being here and everyone knows her. For our family, WMFC is family away from our family," concluded Varner.



"She is a darling little girl who stole my heart from the first smile she shared with me," stated Gerald, "I love her to pieces."

"It is no surprise then that when it comes to personal gifting West Midland Family Center employees also step up and help out as well.


Once again 100% of WMFC employees participated by gifting to **United** Way of Midland County and United Way of Gratiot/Isabella Counties during this pledge season.

And once again WMFC employees exceeded last year's total and gifted \$14,761.60 (an 11.8% increase).

100% of new staff members gave a minimum of \$50 or more.

86% of employees increased the size of their gift over last year.

"West Midland Family Center would have had the doors closed permanently in 1981 when the federal grant that was funding the Center was no longer available. Instead, the United Way answered our call, and they are still helping our community grow stronger. We're very proud to do our share to help this year's campaign be a little more successful," concluded Dorrien.
